ABOUT THE FESTIVAL



We are thrilled to be back for our fourth successive Lyra - Bristol Poetry Festival, a hybrid programme of both live and digital experiences. Our 2022 theme is Breaking Boundaries: New Worlds, which celebrates interdisciplinary poetry across art forms and cultures, translated and multilingual poetry, and poetry as a bridge between groups and communities. 2022 also marks 100 years since the publication of T.S. Eliot's *The Waste Land*, and we'll have both a lecture and a workshop responding to the poem and exploring its relevance in the present day. Lyra's 2022 Festival Poet is writer, poet, performer and historian Edson Burton. Edson will engage in community outreach work, a public performance and workshop, hosting events, and other activities centred on the festival theme.

This year's programme features some of the biggest names in UK and international poetry today, including Roger McGough, Linton Kwesi Johnson, Zena Edwards, Anthony Joseph, Inua Ellams, TJ Dema, Raymond Antrobus, the most recent T.S. Eliot Prize winner, Joelle Taylor, and many more. We are also thrilled to host international guests, including US poets Terrance Hayes and Buddy Wakefield and Argentinian poet Diana Bellessi, as well as performances for young people by two of the nation's favourite poets, Michael Rosen and Daljit Nagra.


The programme includes readings, performances, workshops, family activities, a walking tour, a lecture, a film screening, spoken word cabaret. panel discussions, and poetry advice sessions provided by Literature Works. In the week leading up to the festival, we have two pre-party events. The first is a Weston vs. Bristol poetry slam in Weston-super-Mare's Love's Cafe. bridging a connection between two poetry communities, and the second is a fabulous music and poetry show with Tongue Fu. There is also a wide selection of poetry happenings across Bristol in April listed in our 'Other Events' section.

Accessibility, inclusion and representation are at the heart of Lyra Festival, and this year's programme includes many free and low-cost events, BSL interpreted and captioned events, multilingual readings and a number of participatory activities.

Last year, we were delighted to host a fully digital festival during a national lockdown, and we learned so much about new ways of connecting poetry in Bristol to the rest of the country and the world. We understand how online experiences create new means of access by removing barriers to participation, and we will now continue to offer digital readings, workshops. and pre-recorded videos as part of our festival each year. As always, 100% of the venues are wheelchair accessible. and specific access information can be found on our website. where vou'll also find a form for specific access needs. For our live events, we'll be back at some of Bristol's most stunning venues. including St. George's Bristol, SS Great Britain and Bristol Old Vic

Lyra Festival is co-directed by Dr Lucy English and Danny Pandolfi. Her work demonstrates a deep commitment to progressive politics, ecological conservation and the social condition of the working class in Argentina and Latin America. Her poetry is seen as groundbreaking for its depiction of Lesbian desire and has exerted a strong influence on prominent poets and writers, from the 80s and 90s through to the present day.

DIZRAELI is a genre all of his own. Poet, singer, MC, multi-instrumentalist. His unswerving devotion to pushing the boundaries of lyricism and musical form has earned him a bona fide cult status among those who know, and the raw honesty and humour he brings to his writings on his own mental health, sexuality and the liberation of the human spirit have drawn together people of all shades and ages around his work.

DL WILLIAMS is a deaf queer poet working with British Sign Language and English.
Working with such different languages has inspired a deep interest in translation and how her work can be made accessible to signing and non-signing audiences. They have performed around the UK including at the Scottish Storytelling Centre, Wales Millennium Centre, the Barbican and the Albert Hall, as well as in America and Brazil.

DOMINIC FISHER grew up in Bath and has lived in Bristol for 40 years. He won the Bristol Poetry Prize in 2018, and was recruited to the IsamBards that same year. He published his first collection in 2019, and has another, A Customised Selection of Fireworks, due from Shoestring Press soon. He is a co-editor of Raceme magazine, and spends a lot of time on his allotment in Horfield.

THE MUM POET CLUB is a collective of over 500 mums and parents from across the globe. It was created by one inspired mum, Katharine Perry, who started a peer support group for fellow mum poets. It then evolved into online open mic nights, press publications, live events, and then workshops. This event will be run by Emma Dakeyne and Emily Way, who help to run the Mum Poet Club, with readings from two of their established poets.

NATALIE LINH BOLDERSTON is a Vietnamese-Chinese-British poet. In 2020, she received an Eric Gregory
Award and co-won the Rebecca Swift Women Poets'
Prize. In 2021, she was shortlisted for the Forward Prize for Best Single Poem. She is an alumna of the Roundhouse Poetry Collective and the London Library Emerging Writers Programme. Her pamphlet, *The Protection of Ghosts*, is published with V. Press. She is now working on her first full-length collection.

NIKKI CHAMPAGNIE HARRIS
has been working as a BSL
interpreter for 24 years, as well
as working as a registered
therapist. In 2005, she decided
to leave mental health settings
to work primarily within the arts.
Nikki now specialises her BSL skills
mainly within media and performance and is
one of the founding members of Interpreters
of Colour Network, IOCN. She also runs
workshops around casting BSL interpreters
appropriately for public events and theatre
spaces.

PAMELI BENHAM is a Londoner, born within the sound of Bow Bells. She has been happily settled in Bristol for 25 years, after working in the Middle East and the Thames Valley. Pameli is an actor, director and teacher who sings and writes. Her poems have been printed in anthologies and chapbooks, and her collection, Plentiful As Blackberries, has raised over £5,000 for WaterAid.

RAYMOND ANTROBUS MBE FRSL was born in Hackney, London, to an English mother and Jamaican father. In 2019, he became the first poet to be awarded the Rathbone Folio Prize for best work of literature in any genre. Other accolades include the Ted Hughes Award, PBS Winter Choice, a Sunday Times Young Writer of the Year award, Somerset Maugham Award and The Guardian Poetry Book Of The Year 2018, as well as shortlisting for the Griffin Prize and Forward Prize.



RIAAN VOSLOO is co-founder and bass player/music producer of Tongue Fu. As a bass player and arranger, he has worked with Nostalgia 77, Gregory Porter, Jamie Cullum and The Last Poets. As an educator, Riaan is Course Leader on the MA in Popular Music Practice at BIMM Bristol, having taught at Birmingham and Leeds Conservatoires. He teaches performance, composition, improvisation and cultural theory.

ROGER MCGOUGH is the author of over a hundred books of poetry for adults and children. President of the Poetry Society, he has been honoured with a CBE for services to literature and the Freedom of the City of Liverpool. After Lily The Pink, the Aintree Iron, Scaffold, GRIMMS, The Mersey Sound with Adrian Henri & Brian Patten and his Molière adaptations with English Touring Theatre, Roger presents the long-running Poetry Please. The beat goes on. 'The godfather of modern British poetry' - Metro. 'The patron saint of poetry' - Carol Ann Duffy.

SARAH TREMLETT is a prizewinning poetry film-maker,
poet and theorist and a codirector and editor of
Liberated Words. A curator
and juror at festivals, she has
given numerous talks on the
subject and shown her work
worldwide. Her publication *The Poetics of*Poetry Film (June 2021, Intellect Books UK, and
The University of Chicago Press USA), has
been described as 'A ground-breaking,
encyclopaedic work, an industry Bible, and
essential reading on the genre.'

SOPHIE SHEPHERD is not only a poet, but a Weston-super-Mega-fan who isn't afraid to show it! Her past works have included poems about Weston's brown sea, scooters and overwhelming instagram infographics that tell you how to feel. Sophie usually runs a bimonthly poetry slam in Weston called Rhyme against the Tide and challenged Margate to a head-to-head slam last summer...which saw Weston reign victorious! Bristol better watch out!

STANLEY IYANU is a spoken word poet and writer. He is a member of the 2020/21 Dynamo Poetry Mentoring Scheme, run by Nine Arches Press and Writing West Midlands, and a semi-finalist in the BBC Words First Spoken Word competition 2020. He has performed for Apples & Snakes @ Home (online showcase) and for the Cheltenham Literature Festival - expect some weird and wonderful poetry.

TERRANCE HAYES is the author of six poetry collections: American Sonnets for My Past And Future Assassin, a finalist for the National Book Award, National Book Critics Circle Award and TS Eliot Prize; How to Be Drawn; Lighthead, winner of the 2010 National Book Award for poetry; Muscular Music, recipient of the Kate Tufts Discovery Award; Hip Logic, winner of the 2001 National Poetry Series, and Wind in a Box.

TIERNEY ELLIOTT is a Bathbased spoken word poet and short story writer. She has performed at Shambala Festival, Unislam, Lyra Festival, Roundhouse Slam and more. She has won awards for her poetry about mental health and grief, and was placed fourth at the Roundhouse Slam, as well as becoming the first ever audience winner. Tierney's poetry explores social issues and injustices, but she also endeavours to explore the exciting 'everyday.'

TJAWANGWA DEMA is the author of Mandible, selected for the New-Generation African Poets box set, and The Careless Seamstress, winner of the Sillerman First Book Prize. A poet, educator and arts administrator, her honours include a Botswana Top 40 under-40 award, a Mail and Guardian editor's choice award and fellowships from the University of lowa, Northwestern University and the Danish International Visiting Artists programme. A new collection, an/other pastoral, is due out April 22, 2022.

TOM MARSHMAN has been a practicing artist for over 20 years, and has produced over 60 projects across many mediums, including museum audio-tours, theatre and cabaret.

TOM STOCKLEY (T.S. Idiot) is a multidisciplinary artist working across the UK. Informed by a century of counter-culture and queer theory, their practice flirts with the humour, beauty and sadness of everyday life. Their practice includes digital design, photography, writing, short films and live performance, often created collaboratively with other artists and in community settings. They are proudly queer, gender non-conforming, neurodivergent and a descendant of working-class Jewish refugees.

WARDA YASSIN is an award-winning, British-born Somali poet and secondary school teacher, based in Sheffield.
She was a winner of the 2018 New Poets Prize for her debut pamphlet Tea with Cardamom (Poetry Business, published 2019). Her poetry has been published in places including The North, Magma and Oxford Poetry, and anthologised in Verse Matters (Valley Press), Anthology X (Smith|Doorstop), Halfway Smile and Surfing the Twilight (Hive). In October 2020, she took on the role of Sheffield Poet Laureate.

WENDY PRATT i is a writer from North Yorkshire. Her latest collection When I Think of My Body as a Horse won the 2020 Poetry Business Book and Pamphlet Competition. In 2021 her nonfiction WIP The Ghost Lake was long listed for the Nan Shepherd Prize. Wendy is the founder and editor of print magazine, Spelt. Spelt seeks to celebrate and validate the rural experience, through creative nonfiction and poetry.



ZENA EDWARDS is a poet, performer and climate activist who uses song, movement and global influences as a jump-off for her words. Edwards fuses traditional African instrumentation (the Kalimba and Kora) and new technology to create soundtracks for her poems and stories, producing a body of work that reaches culturally and generationally diverse audiences on an international level.
